April 2019 MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

AWG hosts Walt Wager for the April meeting demonstration

Walt Wager is a woodturner and instructor from Monticello, Florida . About seventeen years ago Walt attended a woodturning demonstration and became engaged in the woodturning craft. One item which Walt is known for turning is his "spiral hollow form". Walt gladly demonstrated the process he uses to create these interesting pieces during our April 2019 club meeting. To create the spiral hollow form shown here, Walt starts with fabrication of the blank. The items shown here are basically spherical, but the technique is not limited to a spherical shape. The first steps involve roughing the blank to the outside shape and applying finish cut on the exterior. The next steps set the locations of the spiral "ribs" on the exterior of the blank. Once the locations of start and end points are established the rib profile (twist) is marked on the blank surface. All the marking is done with pencil. After the profiles have been marked, the spiral ribs are cut with a rotary tool to a fixed depth. The depth serves to help provide a uniform wall thickness during the hollowing process. After cutting the grooves the blank is hollowed in a manner typical to that of creating a hollow form vase or vessel. Special care is taken to use cutting tools that are less likely to create a "catch "and break out a section of rib or ribs and wall. Light and easy cuts that are normal to the point of contact with the interior wall are the target objective. After the hollowing to a wall thickness to open the grooves is obtained the ribs are sanded by hand. The piece is then finished and parted off or finials and end caps applied.

After the blank is turned, the equatorial and radial segments are marked out. These are the straight lines running around the diameter and from top to bottom equally spaced. The groove centerlines are then made by connecting the intersection points with a freehand line. The freehand line is repeated for each set of the "pie" segments , connecting with the next sequential point on the spiral path around the object surface. The quantity of grooves/ ribs defines the pie segment count.

Walt cuts the grooves with a King Arthur's Tools Merlin 2 mini grinder and burr. Walt has a custom bushing he adds to the shaft to control the depth of cut. Once the grooves are cut and the hollowing performed, each edge of the cut is sanded with a cloth backed slip that allows for smoothed continuous edges to be formed. The hollowing is performed after the cutting so that there is sufficient strength in the part during the cutting of grooves. As noted previously, care should be taken to use as clear and solid blank as possible and to perform hollowing cuts that are not aggressive once the cuts break through the groove bottoms. The shape of the piece and structural quality will be negatively impacted if a catch occurs during hollowing, as shown below...



The blank on the right hasn't had the grooves added yet. The blank on the left shows what the results of a catch are. You can see the extent of the hollow forming work and how the grooves are cut in this piece.



This piece is more cylindrical / elongated in shape than the spherical units. It also has a much wider groove cut between ribs.



Here is an example of a spherical spiral hollow form with an end cap and finial. These can be produced as hanging ornaments
